William E. McTurk '48 (1925—2005) Actor, Mentor, Teacher, Activist, Friend... THESPIAN

All of these words have been used to characterize **Bill McTurk '48**, and the one of which he might be most proud was Penn State Thespian. From his undergraduate performing days until his death in May of last year, Bill was a Penn State Thespian, proud of it, and determined to help the organization continue and thrive.

Bill grew up in Pittsburgh, and he entered Penn State in the 1940's. Like many other talented students over the years, he worked as a disc jockey at WMAJ Radio to help pay his expenses. After a two-year break from school to serve in the US Army, Bill returned to campus and graduated in 1948 with a degree in chemical engineering. Somewhere in those years, Bill and Thespians discovered each other, and he began his life-long association with our organization.

Ray Fortunato '47, '52(g) was a student around the same time, and he mentions two Thespian programs that list Bill in the cast. Ray says Bill was usually a character actor, appearing in *No Kick Coming* (December 1946) as well as in several different scenes in *Varsity Sweetheart* (Spring 1947).

Gene Sprague '49, who played trumpet for numerous shows in the late 1940's, remembers Bill as a performer. In later years, Gene got to know Bill better through their involvement in the West-

chester County chapter of the Alumni Association in New York.

The most marvelous picture of Bill McTurk, however, comes from **Jim Dunaway '49**. When hearing of Bill's passing, he sent this remembrance of their college performing days.

"I knew him only as a Thespian. But what a comic actor he was! Slightly built, with reddish-blond hair and a ruddy Irish complexion, his command of the stage was absolute, his face a rubbery mask across which passed a succession of raised eyebrows, open-mouthed astonishment, deadpan stares, and exquisitely timed double-takes...all delivered with assurance and style. To be on stage (with a bit-part line or two) with Bill, Jim 'Mule' Mulholland and **Jimmy Ambandos '48** was so much fun I could barely keep from laughing, even though we'd rehearsed the same silly stuff every night for three weeks. A sample:

'Frankly, Doctor, I'm dubious...'

'Glad to know you, Mr. Dubious!'

Hey, when you can make people laugh with lines like that, you ARE funny. Bless us all, we had a damn good time."

After graduation, Bill was recruited by Exxon where he spent 34 years—as a chemical engineer, a manager in Brussels and Milan, and as a public affairs officer in New York. At the age of 56, he retired to Scarborough, New York with his wife Lois. But wherever he was, Bill McTurk maintained his ties to his beloved Penn State and the Penn State Thespians.

When the Thespian Alumni Interest Group was formed, Bill signed on to serve on the Board of Directors. Who could have foreseen the impact this man would have on TAIG, the undergraduate organization, and the students and alums with whom he

worked?

To the TAIG board, he was the first one who prodded the other members to do more than just attend three meetings a year. He started by looking for ways to

raise funds for Thespians through designated alumni annual gifts. He offered suggestions on how to organize the board, and he was involved in every project undertaken in one way or another. And he loved being an active part of Thespians again!

In 1997, Bill and Lois moved to State College, close to their Dear Old State. This gave Bill the opportunity to bring his visions, dreams, and leadership directly to the Penn State Thespians. He began attending the Thespian meetings, observing everything that was going on and often reminiscing about his own days in the club. He was a tireless advocate for Thespians, going to bat for them in any way he could...with the administration, the Alumni Association, and the Center for the Performing Arts. He was always willing to lend a helping hand and did so wherever possible.

But Bill was always looking for more ways to help Thespians, to try to improve their

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resources. Perhaps his greatest legacy is the Thespian Alumni Gift Fund, which pools all of the alumni donations received by Thespians. This fund has allowed the organization to purchase equipment that would otherwise have been unaffordable. Over \$30,000 in equipment has been purchased for Thespians since the fund was established including tools and equipment for the Thespian workshop, wireless microphones, and a computer for the Thespian office in the HUB. It also made a major contribution toward the complete renovation of the lighting system in Schwab. Bill was instrumental in establishing this fund and insuring its continued vitality. He also served as a mentor to numerous Thespian student officers and their current faculty advisor **Gerald Henry '91**.

For everything he has done for and meant to Thespians, Bill McTurk was awarded the "Distinguished Service to the Penn State Thespians" award in 2004.

And Bill and Lois did even more...they made a \$400,000 pledge to Penn State to support scholarships and the performing arts. A part of this pledge will include \$100,000 to support Thespians' theatrical activities and \$50,000 to aid the Center for the Performing Arts.

Bill did have a few other interests, particularly golf. He was an Executive Committee member of the Metropolitan (NY) Golf Association. Lois was president of the Women's Metropolitan Golf Association and a member of the USGA Women's Committee. Both quickly accepted the WPGA's request to help at Penn State's Rutherford Invitational, where Bill served for many years as a starter.

This past year, Bill had announced he was ready to turn the reins of the TAIG presidency over to new blood. He planned to remain on the TAIG board and was looking forward to focusing on being a mentor to the TAIG and Thespian student officers, hoping to insure the continuation of the work he had begun.

He and Lois had celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary at the Greenbrier Resort in West Virginia and were on their way back to State College on May 12, 2005 when their car rolled over and Bill was killed. Lois survived the accident with

minor injuries. Thespians had lost a vital force and a tireless advocate.

Within days, plans were underway for a permanent tribute to the man who gave so much of himself to Thespians. At Bill's Memorial Service in Schwab Auditorium last June, Thespians and TAIG were pleased to announce the creation of a new Thespian award in Bill's Memory "The William E. McTurk Award for Lifetime Service to the Penn State Thespians." It will be awarded posthumously to Thespian alumni who have given a lifetime of service, vision, and leadership to our organization, just like Bill did. The award will be represented by a plaque which will be prominently placed in the lobby of Schwab, and it will contain spaces to add the names of future recipients.

Every aspect of Bill's service to Thespians bespoke of his boundless energy and character, his passion and enthusiasm, qualities we are proud to see in Thespian members both on-stage and behind-the-scenes. He did not do things half-way, and expected others to follow his lead. It was an honor and privilege to know and work with Bill McTurk...he brought out the best in all of us. He is missed.
